## The Stature of Mary's Baby, and Your Reaction!

Luke 1:26-38

## Intro

Congregation of our Lord Jesus Christ,

You and I have just heard the Holy-Spirit-inspired words of our text (Lk 1:26-38). Do you believe these words?

Do you realise that there are millions (if not billions) of people on earth today who will laugh at these words and their message?

Yes, some of them look at our passage and say, "I don't think I can believe this story, because this is the only place in the Bible where this story is told!"<sup>1</sup>

Then some others look at it and say, "Ha!" "We have heard similar stories from other ancient cultures – folklore that try to embellish the lives of human heroes!" "Yes, we have, for example heard how the Macedonians, tried to make Alexander the Great greater than what he was. So, they claimed that he was born through the union of his mother with the god Zeus!"<sup>2</sup>

Well, what such skeptics can't (or don't want to) see, is that there is a world of difference between the atmosphere of the pagan stories and that of our text. Indeed, it's only through some very speculative and complex reconstructions of ancient pagan stories that a person can come to see parallels between these stories and our text!

And here's the point: Unless the Holy Spirit works faith in the hearts of people, the Christian can, until he is blue in the face, preach the Good News from our passage, and yet that will not make a dent on cold & hard hearts!

But here's the main message of our passage. It says: "Churchgoer, listen carefully and come see the stature of Mary's baby!" "Then believe, be encouraged, and serve God!" Here are the three points of this sermon:

Stature of Mary's Baby

Our text tells us that God sent the Angel Gabriel to a young woman called Mary who lived in the province of Galilee in a town called Nazareth, one of Ancient Israel's less-esteemed villages.<sup>3</sup>

Mary was a virgin and she was engaged to Joseph, a young man from the line of King David.

Engagement in those days was a state that you entered into in a formal and legal way – yes, by contract sealed by oath!

Even though such a couple, in God-honouring way, were not yet living together, the young man could call his fiancée "wife," and she could refer to him as her "husband." Well, suddenly, Gabriel entered Mary's house and said, "Greetings (literally: "Rejoice")<sup>4</sup> you favoured one!" "The Lord is with you!"

Wow! What kind words of blessing!

But, despite the warm & cordial atmosphere which Gabriel tried to create, Mary was greatly perplexed when she saw & heard him!

After all, although, by all indications, Mary was of high moral character, she was still a sinner who suddenly stood face to face with a brilliant, sinless being!

So, again, Gabriel calms her down, saying, "Do not be afraid... for you have found favour with God" (v.30)!

And what enormous favour it was!!

After all, Gabriel now tells her that she is going to expect a baby -a son; in fact, *God's* Son!

Then Mary asks, "But how can this be, seeing that I am not knowing a man<sup>5</sup> (seeing that I'm not intimate with a man)?"

Gabriel answers, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you…"<sup>6</sup>

I want to focus on the word "overshadow."

My brother & sister, this very same word is also used there where, at one time, Moses could not enter the tabernacle because the cloud of God's *presence covered*<sup>7</sup> *the tent of meeting, and the glory of the Lord filled the tabernacle*.<sup>8</sup>

Yes, it was at that stage that we then read (in Ex 40:35), "Moses was not able to enter the tent of meeting because the cloud had <u>settled/dwelt</u> on it..."<sup>9</sup>

The Hebrew word expresses the idea of *settling down*; of *dwelling*; of *resting* and *abiding*.

And so, it was by a special work of God that His Holy Spirit would come down on Mary; yes, that the power of the Most High would, through *covering*, *overshadowing*, *dwelling*, *resting* and *abiding*, work conception in Mary!

Wow!

My brother & sister, just like God Himself is too high for us to fathom, so, too, can you & I not fully understand & describe in biological/physiological terms how exactly God did this.

But what we do get from our text is that, of this special Baby, *Mary* would be the mother and *God Himself* would be the Father!

And in this way, then, would be fulfilled the prophetic word spoken by Daniel to King Nebuchadnezzar when Daniel said to him *that a rock would be cut out*, <u>but not by human hands/doing</u>. – a Rock that would strike the statue of Nebuchadnezzar's dream – a statue representing the world's empires up until the coming of God's Anointed One – that Anointed One who would be that "Rock" not made by human hands/will, but by God; yes, that Rock that would come and crush all worldly rule to establish God's Kingdom that would never end!<sup>10</sup>

A "Rock" – a baby – conceived not by human doing!

And so, this also explains why Gabriel tells Mary (in v. 32 and v.35) that this baby Boy would be called: "*Son of the Most High*," and "*Son of God*," and why He would be *holy*! This also explains why the *LORD God would give Him the throne of His father David* (v.32), and why *He would reign over the house of Jacob forever, and why His kingdom would have no end* (cf. v 33).

In other words, "Dear Mary, can you see why you have found favour in the eyes of God?" "*Your* Son will also be *God's* Son!" "And this Son will be fulfilling the promises God, more than a thousand years ago, made with King David that God would give him a Son from his offspring who would reign on his throne forever!"<sup>11</sup> "Surely, although Solomon was the first of David's offspring to rule on David's throne, he was still only a sinful mortal human being who reigned for but a season." "After all, Mary, although Solomon was also called, "Son of God,"<sup>12</sup> God was not his Father in the way that God will be your

Son's Father!" "So, Mary, here in the person of your (and God's) Son, God will be fulfilling that promise made to David!" "Mary, that's why, by God's command, you must call this Boy, "Jesus" (Yeshua), which means, "He saves" – short for *Jehoshua* which means, "Yahweh saves!"

My brother & sister, we have just heard point 1 of this sermon. So, what is the message point 1 holds out to you and me? Yes, how does point 1's message apply to you & me? Well, in short: it wants you & me to see (and be stunned by) the stature of Mary's baby! Look, Mary's Son had the highest stature a human being has ever had – and ever will have!

No wonder the Apostle Paul would later on say that, regarding this Jesus, *God was* pleased to have all his fullness dwell in Him;<sup>13</sup> and, in Him all the fullness of Deity lives in bodily form!<sup>14</sup>

Well, so far re point 1: "Stature of Mary's Baby." Here is point 2...

## Encouragement

My brother & sister, how did Mary respond?

Well, not in unbelief! Yes, she did not respond in the manner that Zechariah reacted when the same angel (Gabriel) told him he would have a son!

You see, when Mary said, "How can this be?" she was not mistrusting the words of Gabriel. No, she just wanted to have clarity as to how a woman who is not yet married – a woman who is not yet in the state of *knowing* a man – could possibly have a baby!<sup>15</sup> Well, it was then that Gabriel encouraged Mary; yes, when he told her about The Holy Spirit who would come upon her, and about the power of the Most High that would overshadow her (v.35).

But then Gabriel encouraged her further by giving her a sign to confirm that what he had just told her, would indeed come true!

Here is the confirming sign: i.e. that an older relative of Mary, Elizabeth who had been barren and well-advanced in years,<sup>16</sup> was already six months pregnant with a baby who would become the forerunner of Mary's Son!

Yes, Gabriel's words said as much as: "Mary, here is for you a confirming sign!" "You remember Elizabeth, your older relative who was barren?" "Well, God has powerfully worked in her barren womb so that she is now expecting!" "Granted, unlike the baby you're about to conceive, Elizabeth's baby has a *human* father, but, nevertheless, God still engineered that conception inside barren Elizabeth's womb!" "So, Mary, go to Elizabeth and see for yourself, and be strong!"

My brother & sister, how else did Gabriel encourage Mary? Well, by saying to her (in v.37), "...*nothing will be impossible with God*."

Well, think with me: Can God really, without the help of a human husband, make Mary conceive? To ask it in another way: Is baby Jesus the first human being whom God created directly – yes, without human intervention? No!

God has done that before! So, God has already shown that He can do it! You ask, "When did God do that?"

Well, when He created Adam!<sup>17</sup> Indeed, no human being helped God *then*! Thus, is it nonsense to say, "Nothing is impossible for God"? Is it impossible that God, without the help of a human husband, could work conception in Mary? No!

Not at all!

He can do it! He has shown His creative power in abundance!

But I think mankind (also you & I) get, at times, so used to life in this world that we look at ourselves and at creation from a mere under-the-sun perspective! And so, unless we force ourselves to stand still and look at life from an above-the-sun perspective, you & I will not realise that the birth of even *every* baby is a God-initiated miracle! I mean, consider how small the cells are from which a baby gets formed! They are microscopic! Yet, by God's design, in those microscopic cells already sits the germ-seed of every limb and organ of what will become a fully-grown human being: the heart is already represented by cells in that unformed tissue; so are the arms & legs, and the ears & nose; so, too, the reproductive organs although they won't be needed until many years later! And so, what miracle – the conception, growth and birth of every baby! And how true the words of Gabriel: "Nothing is impossible for God!"

So, what do you & I see here under point 2 of this sermon?

Well, we see that when God calls someone for a task, He also kindly & graciously grants that person encouraging confirmation by which He strengthens him/her for the task which He has called them to! That's what He did to Mary!

Here is the last point...

## Willing Service

My brother & sister, you & I can only imagine how Mary must have felt about this news! I mean, what will Joseph say/do when he sees she is pregnant? What will the people in small-town Nazareth say? Think of all the gossip! Will they ever believe her? What if they don't?

Could it be that they will even stone her? After all, is that not what God's Law prescribed for marital unfaithfulness?<sup>18</sup>

Yet, despite all these concerns and fears, Mary said to Gabriel, "Behold, I am the servant of the Lord; let it be to me according to your word."<sup>19</sup>

And so, Mary showed great faith! She believed the words of God! In particular, she believed that the Son whom she would conceive and give birth to would be God's Son – i.e. God (and no human man) would be the Father of this holy Child!

Did Mary, at this stage, have the full picture of her Son's task – of His pain and suffering? Could she, here where she had to respond to Gabriel, envisage how a sword would pierce her very own soul<sup>20</sup> some thirty-plus years later where she would be standing near the cross?

I doubt!!

But she trusted that the One who has begun something great in her will also know how to give strength and uphold whatever betide!

How does this apply to you & me?

Well, firstly, that as you & I hear the words of our text, we will believe that Mary's Baby is who the Bible says He is – the Son of God, fully man and fully God!

Secondly, although you & I will not carry Jesus in the way Mary did, we will nevertheless walk with Him and not be ashamed of Him, and that we will serve God Triune obediently and willingly, from the heart; serving on His terms and for His glory, trusting all the time that, for the life and witness to which God has called you & me, He will also give strength to the measure!

Praise God!
